



Lineage Society Patron



Society of the Cincinnati (1783), Sons of the American Revolution (1889), Sons of the Revolution (1889), Daughters of the American Revolution (1890), Colonial Dames of America (1890), National Society United States Daughters of 1812 (1892 General Society of Colonial Wars (1893), General Society of the War of 1812 (1894), Children of the American Revolution (1895), Order of the Founders and Patriots of America (1896), Mayflower Society (1897), Plantagenet Society (1902), Barons and Dames of Magna Charta (1909), First Families of Virginia (1912), Colonial Dames of the XVII Century (1915), Jamestowne Society (1936), Society of the Descendants of Charlemagne (1984), First Families of Maryland (1999), First Families of Connecticut (2004), and First Families of Pennsylvania. *The Order may accept documented and proven pedigrees accepted by other societies on a case-by-case basis*. [emphasis added] The list will be expanded from time to time. For those applications that do not reach back before 1692, documentary evidence must be provided to connect to the applicant's Founder ancestor.

We, whose names are underwritten, the Loyal Subjects of our dread Sovereign Lord King *James*, by the Grace of God, of *Great Britain*, *France*, and *Ireland*, King, *Defender of the Faith*, &c. Having undertaken for the Glory of God, and Advancement of the Christian Faith, and the Honour of our King and Country, a Voyage to plant the first Colony in the northern Parts of *Virginia*; Do by these Presents, solemnly and mutually, in the Presence of God and one another, covenant and com-

bine ourselves totick, for our better and Furtherance of Virtue hereof do ensuch just and equal Constitutions, and as shall be thought for the general Good we promise all due



gether into a civil Body Poli-Ordering and Preservation, the Ends aforesaid: And by act, constitute, and frame, Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Officers, from time to time, most meet and convenient of the Colony; unto which Submission and Obedience.

Exploration of the New Works

Don Juan Ponce de León, and the Discovery of Florida

This April 2013 marks the 500th anniversary of the European discovery Florida. The Florida peninsula was discovered by Spanish explorer Don Juan Ponce de León.

Juan Ponce de León was born about 1474 in Santervás de Campos, Castilla, between León and Valladolid. The names of his parents are not known with certainty, but the Ponce de León family was of Basque origin. The family descends from Ponce Vélaz, a nobleman of León,


